

RAY METOYER

Ray Metoyer is an award-winning broadcast journalist based in Atlanta, Ga. His career has included television stations in Omaha, Denver, Houston, Dallas, and Atlanta. Through his company Townhall Productions, he is currently working on documentary projects and developing content for Internet and print clients.

Most recently, Metoyer served as the executive producer for news at the Black Family Channel, working primarily on special news programs and documentaries including “Katrina After the Storm.” He also worked on projects that included specials on Ray Charles, Della Reese and Mamie Till Mobley and a documentary on the murder of Emmett Till. He also helped to produce the network’s live coverage of the funeral of Coretta Scott King.

Before working at the Black Family Channel, Metoyer was an anchor/reporter for WGCL-TV in Atlanta, where he focused mainly on news series and investigative reports. As an independent producer he has worked on several documentaries, including specials on Luther Vandross, Patti Labelle and Johnny Cochran.

Metoyer has received five regional Emmys in Atlanta and Denver for news specials and continuing news coverage. His documentaries, “Who Killed Emmett Till?” and “Katrina After the Storm,” received top honors at the 2007 NABJ Salute to Excellence Awards.

Metoyer is a longtime member of the National Association of Black Journalists and has served on the NABJ Board of Directors as a regional director. He is also the former president of the Atlanta Association of Black Journalists, the Omaha Association of Black Journalists and the Colorado Association of Black Journalists. He is also active in National Academy of the Television Arts and Sciences and the Atlanta Press Club.
